

Write a Book in a Day competition

In costumes with creativity, girls from Years 7 to 9 at St. Ursula's College came together for the annual Write a Book in a Day challenge on book day. They split into small teams, designing illustrations and writing chapters filled with heart, humour and hope. These books were designed for children in hospitals across Australia, suffering from life-threatening illnesses. Also, members of the teams and their families set up fundraisers to raise vital funds for kids' cancer research.

Across Australia, 16005 writers in 2248 teams, in 597 schools and writing groups raised over 1 million dollars for the kids' cancer research. Our St. Ursula's students raised over \$200 per team, one team reaching over \$1000, ensuring that their book got published and was judged with a chance to win prizes.

On the day, students bought snacks to thrive and strive throughout the 8 hours. From planning to drafting to drawing to writing, students enjoyed the experience filled with fun and friendship. Fuelled by chips, watermelon, and the occasional burst of candies, each group dove headfirst into their story worlds. Characters were named after inside jokes, and illustrations took shape with colourful flair. Despite the ticking clock, the atmosphere buzzed with creativity and teamwork. Although the occasional headache delayed creativity, the girls powered through with determination and laughter, turning setbacks into inside jokes and plot twists.

"It was challenging to plan but fun to write. Everybody had their own separate ideas; however, we came together with a full story at the end," said a student from grade 9, Rory Sargent, who wrote a book names *Have you seen* my Llama? Each group was given 5 random words to include in their story, along with a main character, secondary character, a non-human character, setting, and plot. The book also had to have Australian elements such as the ABC Classic Radio or Tim Tams, making the experience even more difficult.

In a whirlwind of creativity and compassion, girls from Years 7 to 9 at St. Ursula's College took part in the *Write* a Book in a Day challenge, crafting illustrated stories for children in hospitals while raising over \$200 per teams for kids' cancer research. Fuelled by foods galore and delayed by the occasional headache, after the 8 hours, they delivered excellent books for children in hospitals across Australia.

Run by Calvin and Rosemary Irons, the gallery pays homage to all things mathematics – the origins, important cultural influences, prominent mathematicians, and what mathematics looks like in the modern world.

Alongside Mrs Lange and Mr Harman, we spent a few hours examining the wall displays and exploring the interactive displays, as well as getting ourselves some merchandise from the in-house retail shop. Outside the gallery was a statue of Plato's Hand - This special piece of work was created by Dr Rhyl Hinwood. She was the creator of the Australia Coat of Arms that is displayed in the House of Representatives at Parliament House, Canberra, along with many significant sites in Brisbane. At the end of each finger is a different 3D shape.

Study smarter with short sessions!
